Editorial

This issue of the <u>Newsletter</u> concentrates on two items; the March conference and the sample lists of periodical holdings which were discussed in the previous issue. Nevertheless we give pride of place to correspondence: we hope that Professor Keith's letter and request will lead to a greater use of these pages for the promotion of an exchange of news and information.

Studies in Rural Literature

Dr. Keith has sent us the following letter.
Any information related to the request at the end of the letter should be sent to Professor W. J. Keith, Department of English, University College, University of Toronto, Toronto 5.

Dear Sirs,

Thank you for sending me the recent copy of your newsletter. I am afraid I am one of those persons who should have contacted you before with regard to "news". I hope this letter will make some amends.

My own particular interest is in English rural literature, and this year (1968-9) I am offering for the first time a course on the subject (entitled "Studies in the Rural Literature of England from Thomson to Lawrence") in the graduate school of this University.

Although I suspected, along with many of my colleagues, that the course would not attract very many students, I am glad to say that this has not proved so in the initial year. I have twenty students taking the course for credit plus three regular "auditors", and I have been highly gratified at the enthusiasm that most of the students have shown and the good work that has resulted.

The course centres upon the nineteenth century. Believing that a recognizably rural literature becomes clearly manifest only after the Industrial Revolution, I begin by establishing what a pre-Revolution landscape was like, and examine certain works, including Walton's Compleat Angler, Thomson's Seasons, White's Selborne, etc., and look into related matters such as Enclosures and the developments in agricultural science. During class seminars, either one of the students or myself offers a paper as part of a general survey that indicates something

of the breadth of the subject and draws attention to some of the more important but neglected writers or works. Then each student undertakes two major research-essays, the subjects for which he is free to choose from the whole range of English rural literature. Novelists, poets, essayists are all represented, and it seems as if the course is holding together and that some evolving sense of a rural tradition is emerging. At least it can be said that this is a fresh, off-the-beaten-track kind of course-which is one reason, I believe, for its popularity.

The difficulty with such a course is that one has to be one's own pioneer. There are no comprehensive bibliographies, no "background books", etc., to aid one in planning and organizing the subject-matter. I have had to rely on following up any particular clue that comes my way, and I am most anxious to gather together as much information as possible concerning this neglected and, I think, extremely important topic.

I would therefore welcome communications on this subject from other members, and would be most grateful to you if you would draw attention to this request in a future edition of your newsletter.

Victorian Periodicals: A Sample Listing

The purpose of this sample listing of periodical holdings was discussed at length in the last issue of the Newsletter (No. 2, November 1968) when a number of the problems involved in preparing any form of check list were also detailed. The following lists follow on the previous discussion. It is essential to understand certain limitations which, even so, affect these lists, and to realise that in no way at all can the two sets of holdings be regarded as a comparison between two university libraries. Queen's University, while raising a number of pertinent questions about the project, provided a list of holdings of titles currently or to be included in the Wellesley Index. We are presenting the list without comment for the moment, but the issues raised by Queen's will be germane to any further consideration of the project. For this reason the first section limits itself to Wellesley titles held by both Universities. The University of Western Ontario's listing, while not restricted, omits reference to current purchasing of original or microfilmed serials which include the Wellesley titles. In both cases it has been a matter of deliberate policy to show only British publications.

What we have then, are two specimens of reasonably up-to-date periodicals holdings in the Victorian period, based on two different principles of selection and showing differences in method of presentation. We hope that this sample check list will initiate discussion on the complexities of a serials project as well as direct attention to the possibilities which could be provided by a complete serials list covering all Ontario institutions. Readers will hardly need reminding of the relevance of such a project to Michael Wolff's proposals.

We are grateful to the staff at both Universities who have somehow found time to assemble the information and to give preliminary thought to some of the problems. Any errors in copying the information are strictly our own.
